Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you for attending recent open classrooms and parents' evening sessions. It has been really positive to meet with you all in support of your children's learning. If you were unable to attend either, open classroom information is now on the school website under your child's class link. If you haven't met with the teacher, please contact the school office to arrange a time.

Following feedback from parent/ carer questionnaires re homework, we have discussed how we do this as a staff and are going to implement a new system. Education city is an online learning platform which the children enjoy using. Class teachers will set a task on the platform for children to complete. We would like the children to complete the task with your support which will enable them to share their learning with you. If you don't have access to a laptop or tablet device for children to work on, please let your child's class teacher know so that they can give children the opportunity to complete the tasks. Whilst we want to encourage children to further develop and share their learning through homework, we don't want this to take away from family time or free time. By using Education city, we hope for this to be an enjoyable learning experience. There will not be sanctions for children who don't complete the tasks but we do expect Years 5 and 6 to organise their time to achieve the tasks. This will prepare them for Secondary school expectations. Teachers may also set a family learning activity for children which links to the class topic.

Reading at home each day remains an expectation for all children, this may take the form of reading independently, reading to you or being read to by you. All of which will develop children's skills and love of reading. Thank you for your support with all home learning, it really helps us to develop your child's skills in school.

Next half term, please look out for new photographs of the children on the school website. We are very grateful to Flo Westbrook for taking a range of fantastic images of the school. In addition to the website, some of these will be selected for display in school.

The Dragon pub is now open for breakfast on Mondays to Saturdays. As a result, they can only accommodate parking during the morning if you are also purchasing a break-fast item. If this isn't something you would like to do, please remember that our drop off system works really well from 8.20am. The playground is fully secure and an extra adult (in addition to the person on the gate) is on duty from 8.30am. Congestion occurs nearer to 8.40 so to avoid this, please drop off a little earlier if you can.

Working With Others

At Colgate School we are incredibly lucky to be a member of the Working With Others (WWO) schools partnership. Working With Others is all about teaching children the skills they need to work as part of a team. It raises attainment in learning but also helps children to be more motivated, engaged and happier at school. It isn't just about learning at school though, it's about providing children with the fundamental skills they will need to succeed when working and interacting with others throughout their lives.

Our Working With Others skills this term revolve around active listening (except in EYFS where they will be practising knowing and using names, good eye contact and taking turns). Our first whole school skill is stopping and being ready to listen. Good listening skills are needed to develop empathy and understanding with pupils and to assess whether they understand what they are being taught. Listening skills also help pupils share ideas, take turns, compromise and negotiate in school.
